mens of Menispora recently collected here one of which marked I in the box I have never been able to compare with an authentic specimen of M. Libertiana. This species I have never seen, as the only exsiccati specimen which we have contains only Trichoderma lignorum. The spores of this form, which is common here, appear to agree closely with what you call (Fresenius) var. Fresenii under Libertiana and which he called tortuosa. The other form marked II appears to be peculiar from the scattered but conspicuous verrucosities near the bases of the erect fertile hyphae which do not appear to be present in any of the species that I have seen.

I was very much obliged for your card concerning the Stemphylium which I sent last spring. I used the wrong name when I compared it to botryosum. It seemed near macrosporoideum, with which I had compared it but also seemed to differ in its smooth spores and in the fact that it never becomes opaque. I have sent you recently through the Smithsonian a copy of my last Monograph which I hope may reach you safely.
