EVERY OTHER SUMMER the world's largest art exhibition is held in a public garden in the Adriatic sea. The Venice Biennale, originally known as the Esposizione Internazionale d'Arte della Città di Venezia, was initiated in 1895 by the playwright Riccardo Selvatico and a group of artists. Fifteen nations including the United States were represented in the first exhibition; thirty presented their artists at the Thirtieth Biennale in 1960. Only the two World Wars have interrupted the sequence of these great exhibitions of contemporary art; the Biennale was not held in 1916, 1918, or 1944, 1946. Until 1929 it was sponsored by the City of Venice. Now the Biennale functions as an autonomous organization, perennially engaged in planning and preparing the presentation of this most important of international exhibitions.

For some years The American Federation of Arts has been eager to present in the United States a selection of works from a Venice Biennale. In the summer of 1960, while visiting the exhibition, I stopped in to see Dr. Umbro Apollonio, Technical Adviser to the Biennale's Secretary General, and this selection is the result of our conversation. Had it not been for his personal interest, assistance, and attention to the many complexities involved in bringing these works to our shores, this presentation of VENICE BIENNALE PRIZE-WINNERS 1960 could not have been realized.

Twenty-one artists were awarded prizes at the Thirtieth Biennale; seventeen are represented here. Because we wished to include in this exhibition only examples actually shown in Venice, we have regretfully omitted four prize-winners whose entire representation had previously been committed to other exhibitions following the close of the Biennale. They are: *Julius Bissier*, German painter, winner of the 500,000 Lire Prize given by the Museum of Modern Art of São Paulo; *Hans Hartung*, French painter, winner of one of the two Official Italian Prizes for Foreigners; *Manabu Mabe*, Brazilian painter, winner of the Fiat Prize of 200,000 Lire open

to an Italian or Foreign painter, sculptor, or graphic artist; and *Eduardo Paolozzi*, British sculptor, winner of the David E. Bright Foundation 500,000 Lire Prize for a sculptor under 45 years of age who has not previously been awarded an international prize at the Biennale.

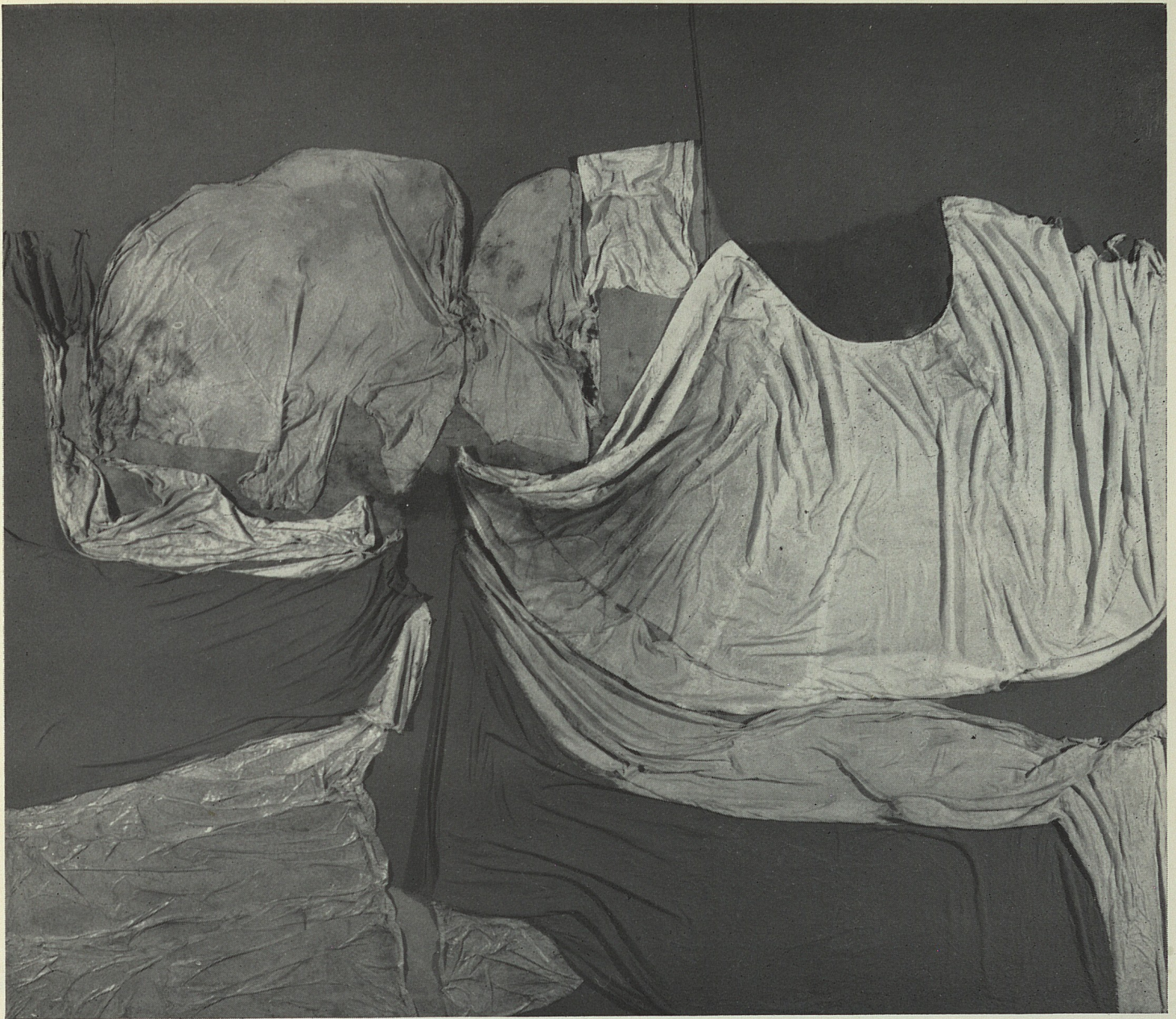
Artists from France, Greece, Italy, Poland, Spain, and the United States are among the seventeen prize-winners represented in this exhibition. It was our original intention to include two examples by each artist where the works were large, and four examples of smaller works such as drawings and prints. Problems of obtaining loans for a circulating exhibition have altered slightly this neat pattern. We are, however, extremely grateful to those who have made it possible for us to present these thirty-eight fine examples. Artists, dealers, private collectors and public institutions all have contributed generously to this exhibition. Some of the works are for sale and we hope they will find homes in this country.

We should like also to express our gratitude to the Italian Line for its assistance in providing free transport from Italy to New York, and to Dr. Filippo Donini, Director of the Italian Cultural Institute, New York City, whose interest in this project from its inception has been most helpful.

Here, then, is a sample of what the judges thought the best of the Biennale.

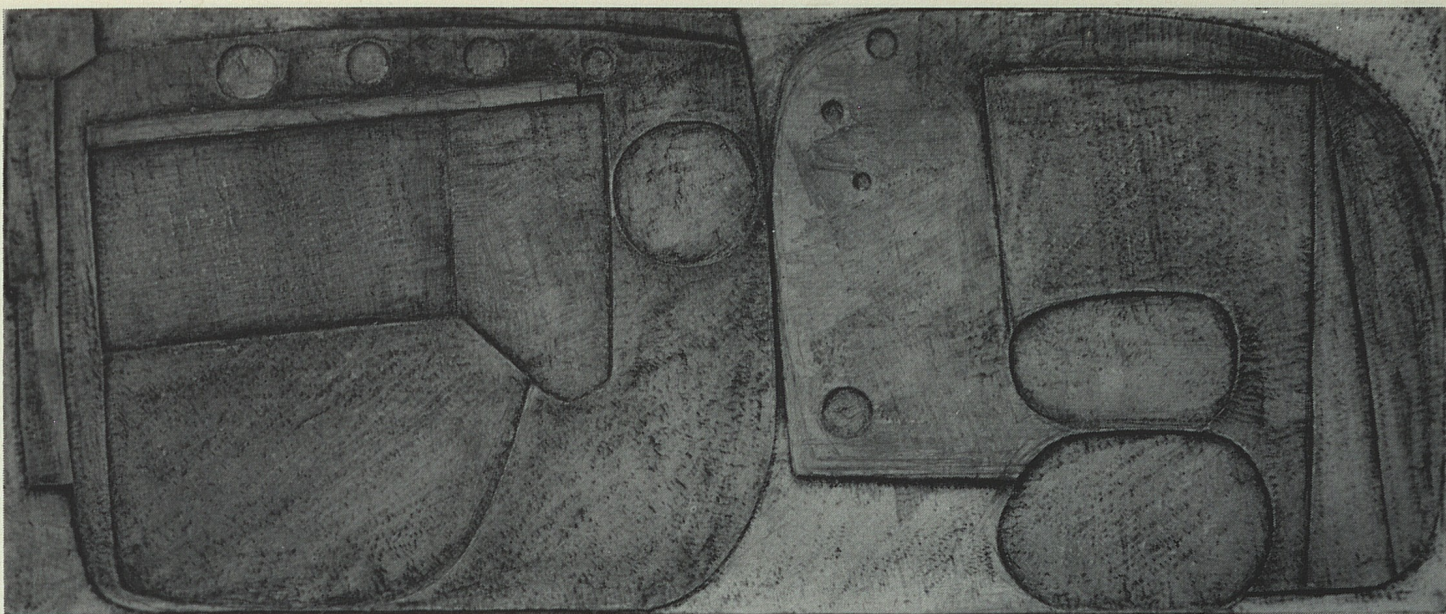

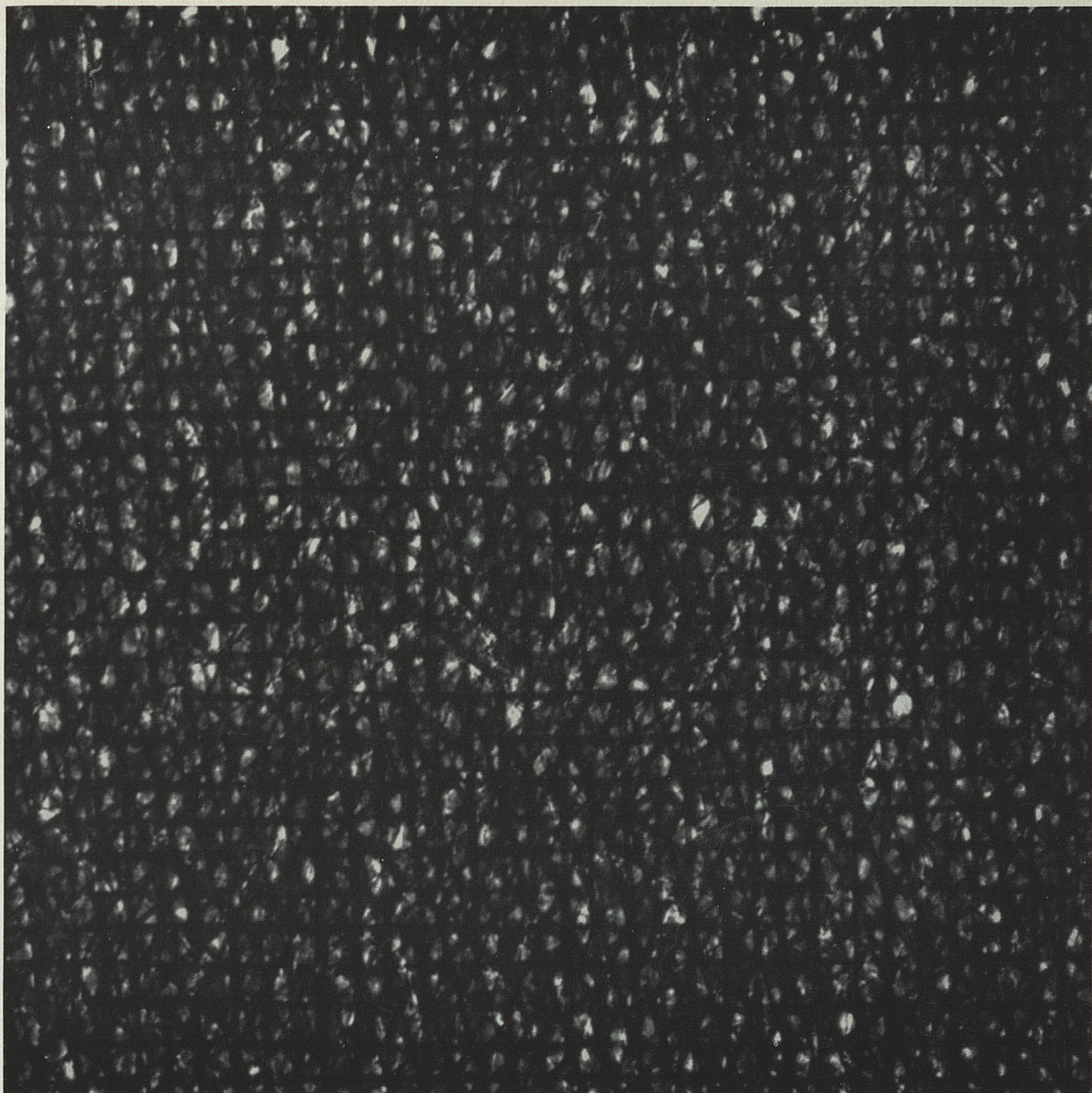

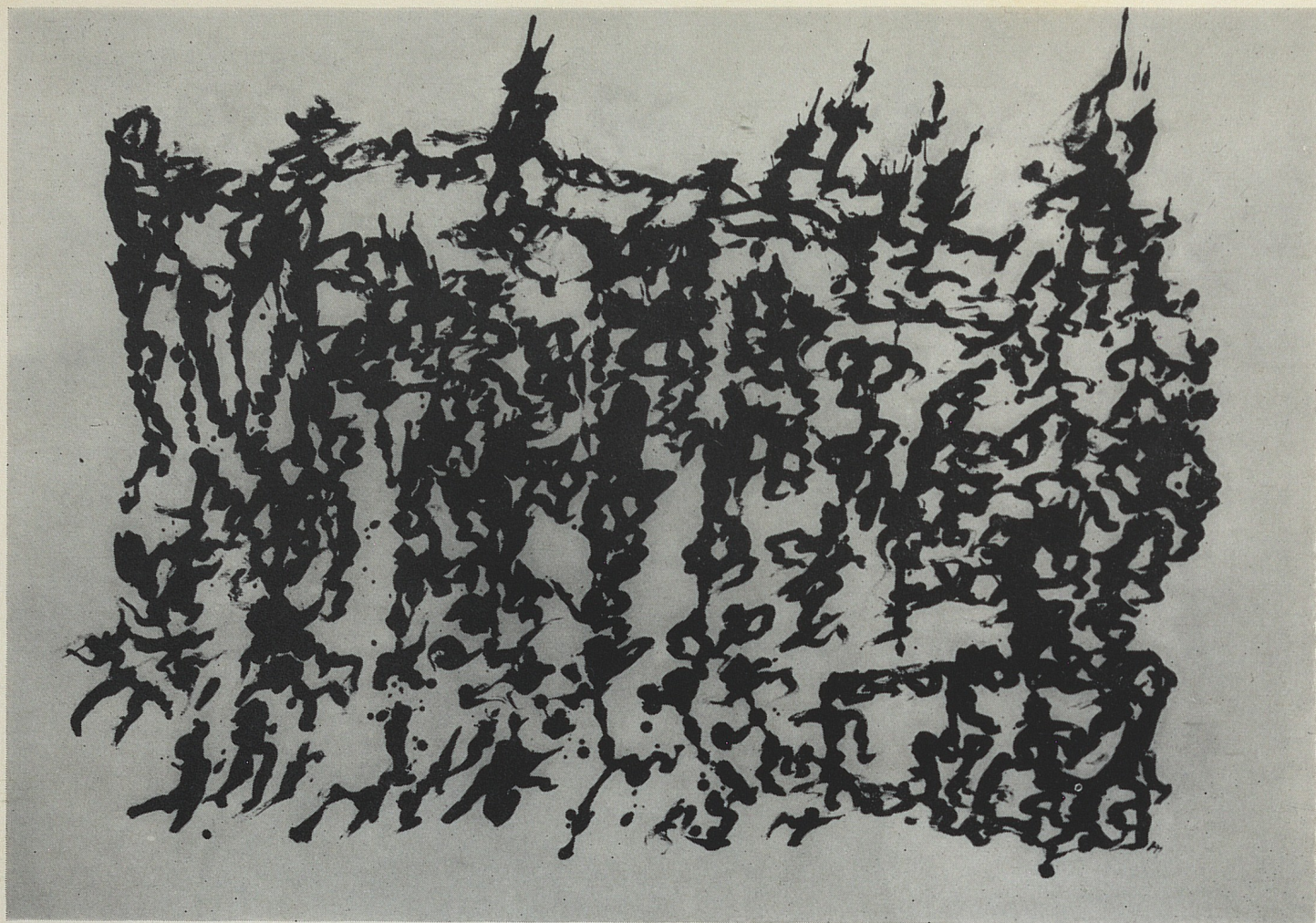

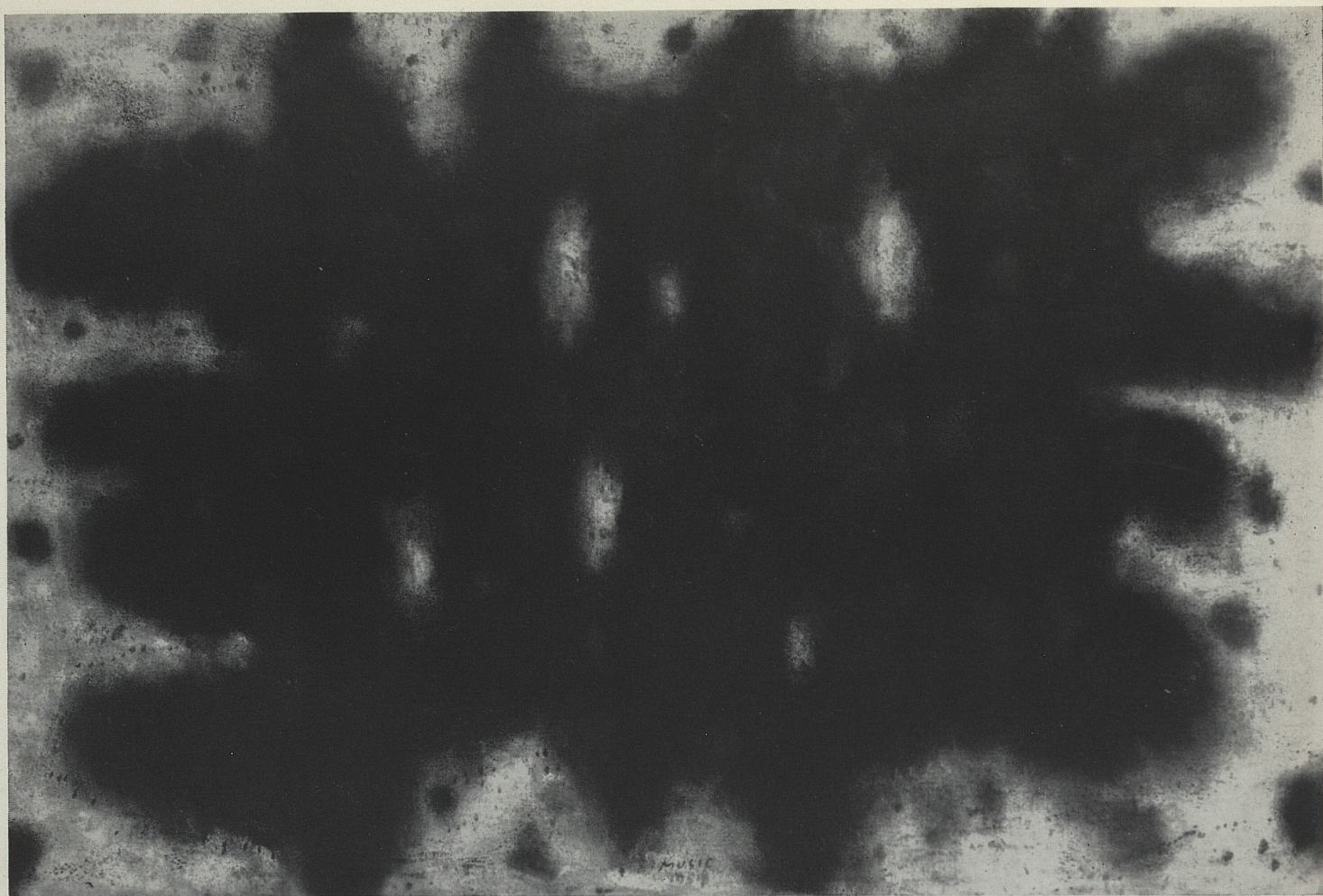
