


Skills for the digital age

As learners increasingly interact with digital content there is a growing need to support them in understanding how to interpret, question, and critically engage with the information they encounter.

- European Commission's Digital Education Action Plan 2021–2027 highlights digital literacy as
 a core competence, essential for full participation in democratic life and for combating
 disinformation.
- The 2023 European Council Recommendation on improving digital skills in education and training calls for the integration of media literacy into all levels of formal education, supporting learners in navigating complex digital environments.
- The Council of Europe declared 2025 the Year of Digital Citizenship Education, reinforcing the need to empower learners not just to use digital tools—but to do so ethically, responsibly, and critically.







How does Europeana contribute?

At a fundamental level, Europeana supports medial literacy by providing:

- Access to a vast collection of primary sources, including historical documents, artworks, and multimedia resources.
- Openly licensed content, educating users on copyright and ethical digital usage.
- Multilingual materials, making digital cultural heritage more accessible and inclusive.

How depictions of The Last Supper changed during the Renaissance

Since the Last Supper is one of the most common themes in religious art, it has always been interpreted and used in different ways by various artists. The paintings in this collection are arranged chronologically, beginning in the early 15th century up until the mid- 17th century. The main idea of this source collection, is to have an overview of the changes this painting went through during the Renaissance period, in order to compare and contrast the different meanings that were conveved and the different styles that were used.

This source collection was made by Francesca Rabitti with the support of Bob Stradling of the Historiana editing team. It is part of the Europeana DSI4 project. The collection makes use of sources from Europeana Collection.



Europeana in STEM Education





Engineer and educator Teddy Tablante used historical images from Europeana in his videos to explain the evolution of steam engine engineering.

These visuals helped him connect past innovations to modern technology for STEM learners.



Europeana in Primary Education

Panagiota Bali, a primary school teacher in Greece, created custom Europeana galleries on healthy and unhealthy food to teach nutrition and vocabulary to 9-year-olds.

Her students explored food properties, designed illustrated recipes using Europeana images, and involved their families in the process, making learning creative, collaborative, and fun!




Creative Inspiration & Languages

At Spark Young Writers workshops in the UK, Rick sanders used Europeana's story dice to inspire 9–11-year-olds.

The children built their own dice and rolled them to combine characters, objects, or scenes, then wrote poems or short stories based on what they got.

This hands-on activity made **writing** playful and engaging, and it can be easily adapted for **language learning** to practice vocabulary, grammar, and storytelling.

Through this initiative, participants develop digital literacy and technical skills via creative projects and workshops by learning to build immersive environments and using cultural heritage content










Built with Bits 4


